I. TELAL DAT: The accused was tried at Dachau, German, on 10 November 1947, before a General Military Government Court.

II. OF POTA AND PARTICULARS:

CHARGY I: Violation of the Laws and Usaces of Mar.

Particulars: In that Georg FT TMZTLIF, a German national, did, at or in the vicinity of Fordhausen, Germany, in or about October 1944, wrongfully ancourage, aid, abot and participate in committing an assault upon approximately twenty non-German nationals, immates of ordhausen Concentration Camp, who were then in the custody of the then German Paich.

CHIEF II: Wielstion of the Laws and Usages of war.

articulars: In that Georg FINANZILIER, a German national, did, at or in the vicinity of Nordhausen, Germany, in or about December 1944, wrongfully encourage, aid, abet and participate in the killing of an unknown Yugoslav national, an immate of Fordhausen Someontration Camp, who was then in the custody of the then German Meich.

Particulars: In that Georg FINEWALL R, a German n tional, did, at or in the vicinity of iener-custadt, ustria, in or about September 1943, wrongfully encourage, aid, abot and participate in the killing of an unknown Polish national, an inmute of Mauthausen Concentration Samp, who was then in the custody of the then German Match.

III. SU MARY OF TWIDING: Accused FINKING ILLE was at wamp Dora Concontration Camp, near Nordhausen, wermany, from November 1943 until 4 April 1945 as a superior cape at the stone quarry tunnel detail.

He best inmates, especially Poles, with a he vy stick until they became unconscious and had to be sent to the hospital. A Yugoslav inmate died from a beating by the accused.

Evidence for Prosecution: Nawrzyniak, a former Polish immate of Camp Dora, near Nordhausen, Germany, in his extrajudicial sworn statement stated from August 1944 until 4 April 1945 he worked on the tunnel detail, and that he saw the accused, while acting as a cape on this detail, best immates with a heavy stick until they became unconsicus and had to be removed to the hospital (R 30; P-TX 7).

A former French inmate in his extrajudicial swern statement stated that he worked on the tunnel detail at Camp Dora, and that between September and LL Nevember 1944, the accused beat immates in the tunnel with his fist and with a stick (F 31; P-Ex 8).

Another former Polish inmate in an extrajudicial sworn statement stated that the accused "before Christmas 1944" while a superior cape in the turnels at Camp Dora beat a Yugoslav inmate with a cudgel so severely that the immate died within three or four hours (R 30; P-Ex 6).

Dofense witness Ziezek testified that he was an immate of Camp D rafrom the end of 1943 or the beginning of 1944 with duty as a clerk for the accused (R 40). On cross-examination he testified that on several eccasions he saw the accused mistreat Polish immates because they were Poles. The witness said that he did not look at the beatings but understood that the accused used a stick or a rubber hose (R 42). The witness reaffirmed on redirect examination that he saw the accused beat prisoners (R 44). The witness remained at the camp until the final evacuation (R 47) and was with the detail that worked in the tunnel (R 48).

In his own testimony the accused admitted that he was at Camp Dara, near Nordhausen, Germany, from Nevember 1943 until the evacuation

4 April 1945 (7 51). He admitted that he best immates with a stick about three feet long and one inch in diameter. He said, however, that such beatings were for the punishment of individuals for infractions of rules which otherwise would have caused his entire group to be punished (R 56-58). Fe further testified that the immates in the stone quarry detail were Russians and Poles and other nationals (F 57).

The accused was acquitted on Charges II and III and evidence relating solely to those charges has not been set out.

widence for Defense: One witness, a former inmate, testified that he was a clerk for the inmate details that worked in the stone quarry tunnels of which the accused was superior capo or inmate foremen through 1944 to april 1945; that he saw the accused every day; that he never heard of an inmate being killed by the accused; and that he never saw the accused best any inmate sufficiently to warrant hospitalization (I 40, 41). Another former inmate testified that he never heard that the accused killed anyone at Camp Dora (F 35, 36).

The accused was at Dora from Aovember 1943 to 4 pril 1945 (* 51). He testified that he best immates for stealing food from other immates, but never so hard that they were unable to work (E 55, 57, 59). He denied killing a Yugoslav immate (E 58).

Bufficlency of .vidence: The findings of guilty as to Charge I are not warranted by the evidence.

Petitions: To Petitions for Review were filed. A Petition for Clemency, was filed by Dr. Karl Durst, German counsel for the accused, 16 January 1948.

Recommendation: That the findings and sentence be disapproved.

V. OU STICES OF LAT:

It is clear that the Court had jurisdiction of the person of the accused and of the subject matter.

xamination of the entire record fails to disclose any error or omission which resulted in injustice to the accused.

- 1. It is recommended that the findings and sentence be disapproved.
- 2. Legal Forms Nos. 13 and 16 to accomplish this result are attached hereto, should It meet with approval.
