CHARGE: Violation of the Laws

Pleas Findings

PARTICULARS: in that Fermann BUNGSTOR BOTHNSCHEIM BRUECKNER and Arno BOERMSCHEIM, German nationals, did, on or about 29 July 1944, at or near Buttetadt, Kreis Weimar, Germany, wilfully, deliberately and wrongfully encourage, aid, abet and participate in the killing of a member of the United St tes Army, believed to be 2nd Lt. Charles A. Norby, who was then and there an unarmed and surrendered prisoner of war in the custody of the then German Reich.

2. RECOMMENDATIONS: That the findings and sentence be approved.

3. EVIDENCE:

For the Prosecution. On or about 29 July 1944 an American cirmon, 2nd Lt. Charles A. Norby, paracheted to safety near Buttstadt, Germany, surrendered to an unknown farmer and was escorted to a police station at Buttstadt, from where he was removed by two auxiliary policemen, Hermann BRUECKNER and Arno BOERTSCHEIN.

in an automobile driven by Dr. Becker (P-Ex 1, 2a). They left ostonsibly for Weimar. After they reached the edge of the town of Buttstadt on the road to Weimar, BRUECKNER ordered Dr. Becker to turn the car around and take another road to Weimar. "hen Booker stopped the car to turn it around, BRUNCYNER, BCERNSCHEIN and the American airman got out of the car, the airman walking fast into the wheat field which was by the side of the read. BHURCKYER ordered him to halt. The airman obeyed and sountted in the wheat and thereupon BRUECKYER shot him to death, through the right front temple (P-Ex 3, 4a, 5). BRHECKHIR afterwards boasted to various friends that he had killed an American flyer (P-7x 5). BRUNCKVER kept his eyes on the airman from the time he got out of the automobile until he shot him and the wirman was kneeling when shot by BRUCKWER. Arno BOERNSCHMIN stated in Exhibit P-3 that he thought BRUNCKTER received an order from Hoffman to kill this American airman on the way to Weimar and not to take the airman to Weimar. and that he could tell from the expression on the faces of the mon who ware his superiors to whom BRUMCKAMER made his report that they were well pleased with BRUCKYER for having killed the American at man.

For the Defense: When Dr. Becker stopped the car to turn it around, BRUECKNER, who was sitting in the rear of the airman, jumped out of the car, walked around to the rear of it in order to assist Bocker from backing into the ditch (R 69). This BRUECKNER was in the rear of the car the airman opened the door on his side, (R 69) got out, walked a few stees, then ran into the wheat field (R 55).

BRUECKNER saw him, ran after him and hollered 'halt" two or three times (R 60). The airman balted, squatted and faced BRUECKNER, who walked up to him and told him to go back to the car (R 69, 70).

Then BRUECKNER came close enough to the airman he surang at BRUECKNER and grasped him by the sleeve of the arm in which BRUECKNER hold the pistol, which accidentally went off and shot the airman through the

right front temple (R 69, 70, 72) killing him instantly (R 70, 72, 76, 77). BRUECKPER ran away from the scene (R 64, 71, 78) and novor beasted to anyone that he had killed an airman (P-Ex 3, page 5), but on the other hand expressed regret that it had to be done (R 51).

4. JURISDICTION: The Court was locally constituted and had jurisdiction of the persons of the accused and of the offenses.

5. COUNTETS: There was sufficient evidence before the Court to establish beyond a reasonable doubt that the accused Hermann BRUECKPER was guilty of the charges and particulars in accordance with the findings of the Court.

The Court was presented with an abundance of evidence in connection with the intent of the accused Hermann BRIECUNIE to murder the American airman (F-Ex &, 5, 7). The only evidence before the Court against Arno BOIRNSCHEIN was that he was present when the shooting was done but there was no evidence before the Court that the accused BOIRNSCHEIF intended to will the airman or knew that he was to be killed. Defense counsel objected strenuously to the introduction of Hoffman into the trial (R 7) but the interests of the accused were not prejudiced by the introduction of such testimony in regard to Hoffman and in Exhibit P-3, page 16, it was stated by BOIRNSCHEIN that he thought that BRUECKNIE received an order from Hoffman "to kill the American airman on the way to Weimar and not to bring the airman to Weimar". Examination of the entire record fails to disclose any error or emmission which resulted in injustice to the accused.

The prosecution tried this case entirely on the record from exhibits marked P-1, 2, 2a, 3, 4, 5, 6, 6a, 7. These exhibits were received by the Court. It is true that prosecution put one witness upon the stand, Hermann Heinrich Jakob, but the evidence given by him, in fact, had no bearing upon the case one way or another.

6. CLEMENCY: There are no Potitions for Review filed by the defense nor are there any Potitions for Clemency accompanying the record of trial.

7. CONCLUSIONS:

- a. It is recommended that the findings and sentence be approved.
- b. Legal Forms Nos. 13 and 16 to accomplish this result are attached bareto, should it next with approval.
