

Voting Practices in the United Nations 2017



**Report to Congress
Submitted Pursuant to
Public Laws 101-246
and 108-447**

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I — INTRODUCTION

The Report to the Congress on Voting Practices in the United Nations was first published in 1984, for the year 1983 pursuant to Public Law 98-151 and Public Law 98-164. This year's report is submitted in accordance with Section 406 of Public Law 101-246 as amended by Public Law 108-447.

This report reviews voting practices in the UN Security Council and the UN General Assembly (UNGA) in calendar year 2017, and presents data in a variety of formats. The report statistically measures the overall voting of UN member states at the General Assembly in the calendar year 2017 in comparison with the U.S. voting record (Section II). It also lists and describes UNGA resolutions selected as particularly important to U.S. interests (Section III). It then presents the voting patterns on General Assembly resolutions relating to Israel (Section IV). The report lists a side-by-side analysis for every country according to their respective UN regional grouping (Section V). Finally, all UN Security Council resolutions and votes for the calendar year are described, and voting on them is tabulated (Section VI).

Voting coincidence provides the “comparison of the overall voting practices in the principle bodies of the United Nations” requested by the Congress. Because the United Nations acts on so many diverse issues, the voting record of a UN member during the General Assembly (193 members) and Security Council (5 permanent and 10 rotating members) provides insight into a country's orientation in world arenas: where it stands, with whom it stands (at least in a UN context), and for what purpose. Voting coincidence data refers only to the UN context and does not take account of support for U.S. policy in other contexts. The vast majority of resolutions in various UN bodies are approved by consensus where no votes were taken. Overall voting correlation between countries is highly dependent on the types of resolutions that come to a vote. For example, in the UNGA, Israeli-Palestinian issues account for approximately one-quarter of resolutions that are adopted with a vote, skewing the voting coincidence metrics for countries that oppose these resolutions.

FORMAT AND METHODOLOGY

The format and presentation of this report are consistent with provisions in Section 406 of Public Law 101-246, as amended by Public Law 108-447. The tables in this report reflect country “voting coincidence” with the United States computed on the basis of all recorded final plenary votes in either the UN General Assembly or Security Council. The computation excludes issues approved without a vote, procedural motions, preliminary votes, or votes on which either the United States or the country with which it is being compared did not cast a vote (absentee).

This year the Department of State updated its methodology to ensure that abstentions are reflected and to emphasize the votes taken on final resolutions over those taken on preliminary texts. These updates are intended to capture more accurately the voting conduct of UN member states.

Final plenary votes are decisions on full resolutions and in this report correspond to the resolutions adopted ‘with a vote.’ Preliminary votes are decisions on an operative or preamble paragraph of a resolution. Such votes are taken in advance of the final plenary action, and in previous versions of this report, these preliminary votes were combined with final plenary votes in calculating voting coincidence. This practice had the effect of distorting the overall voting coincidence. This distortion stemmed from the repetitive nature of preliminary votes (contentious resolutions often features as many as a dozen such votes on specific paragraphs), which may or may not correspond with a member state’s ultimate position on the final plenary vote. The updated voting coincidence methodology only measures that final position against the final position of the United States.

Abstentions (‘abstain’ votes) are included in coincidence metrics for a more comprehensive review and to better measure the shifting support of countries. Solitary abstentions are provided in a new column titled ‘partial’ identifying either the select country or the United States as having abstained on a vote.

Absences continue to be excluded from voting coincidence calculations given that the reasons for a country’s absence can vary from political (purposely skipping) to situational (unable to attend). Absentee counts are provided in the ‘absent’ column and should be taken into consideration along with the voting coincidence rate for a better understanding of a countries' voting behavior.

The methodology for obtaining the “voting coincidence” is comparing how the United States and the listed country voted. Votes are placed into one of four categories: same; opposite; partial; and absent. “**Same**” is the total number of times the United States and the listed country voted together. “**Opposite**” is the total number of times the United States and the listed country voted counter to each other. As part of this year’s updated methodology, a new column was included; “**Partial**” is the number of times the United States and the listed country were partially aligned (one country, but not both, abstained on a resolution). “**Absent**” is the number of times the listed country did not vote. The “**Voting Coincidence**” with the United States is calculated by adding one (1) point for every ‘same’ vote, zero (0) points for every ‘opposite’ vote, and a half (½) point for every ‘partial’ vote. The total number of points is then divided by the total number of votes excluding absences.

II — GENERAL ASSEMBLY: OVERALL VOTES

This year the Department of State updated its methodology for this report to ensure that abstentions are reflected and to emphasize the votes taken on final resolutions over those taken on preliminary texts. These updates are intended to capture more accurately the voting conduct of UN member states. Of the 323 resolutions adopted by the UN General Assembly in 2017, 93 resolutions required a vote (29 percent) and 230 resolutions were adopted by consensus ‘without a vote’ (71 percent).

Key Results:

- Using the new methodology, voting coincidence with the United States in the UN General Assembly was **31 percent** in 2017. For purposes of comparison, using the previous methodology (excluding abstentions and including preliminary votes), the 2017 coincidence rate was **37 percent**.
- As additional context, the 2016 coincidence rate (using the new methodology) was **41 percent** versus **54.8 percent**, which was the number reported using the previous methodology.
- In 2017, the United States voted against more UN General Assembly resolutions (71 percent) than any other UN member state. The average UN member state voted against six percent of resolutions. In 2016, the United States also voted against the most resolutions (58 percent).

For historical comparison, following are the overall coincidence rates for the last 10 years when using the new methodology:

Abstentions: In 2017, 11 percent of all recorded votes by all member states in the General Assembly were abstentions. The United States abstained on 10 votes (11 percent).

Absences: The average UN member state was absent for eight out of 93 General Assembly votes (nine percent) in 2017. The country with the most absences was Sao Tome and Principe, which missed 90 out of 93 votes. Forty member states were present for all 93 votes, including the United States.

Isolated Votes: The United States voted by itself against two resolutions¹. The United States voted with one other country in opposition to 16 resolutions: joining the United Kingdom on one² and Israel on 15³.

Allies and Adversaries: In 2017, Israel had the highest voting coincidence with the United States, and Zimbabwe had the lowest. The 10 countries with the highest voting coincidence with

the United States were, in descending order: Israel, Micronesia, Canada, Marshall Islands, Australia, United Kingdom, France, Palau, Ukraine, and the Czech Republic. The 10 countries with the lowest voting coincidence with the United States were, in ascending order: Zimbabwe, Burundi, Iran, Syria, Venezuela, North Korea, Turkmenistan, Cuba, Bolivia, and South Africa.

TABLE SHOWING COMPARISON WITH U.S. VOTES

The table that follows summarizes UN member state voting records for all 93 final plenary votes that occurred in the UN General Assembly during 2017. The **methodology** for obtaining the “voting coincidence” is comparing how the United States and the listed country voted. Votes are placed into one of four categories: same, opposite, partial, and absent. “**Same**” is the total number of times the United States and the listed country voted together. “**Opposite**” is the total number of times the United States and the listed country voted counter to each other. As part of this year’s updated methodology, a new column was included. “**Partial**” is the number of times the United States and the listed country were partially aligned (one country, but not both, abstained on a resolution). “**Absent**” is the number of times the listed country did not vote. III — GENERAL ASSEMBLY: IMPORTANT ACTIONS

Public Law 101-246 calls for a listing of important UN General Assembly (UNGA) votes, defined as “votes on issues which directly affected important United States interests and on which the United States lobbied extensively.” For the 72nd UNGA in 2017, 27 resolutions were identified for inclusion in this section; 10 were adopted without a vote and 17 adopted with a vote. Of the 17 important resolutions adopted with a vote, the United States voted in favor of eight, opposed nine, abstained on zero, and did not miss any votes. Section IV contains two parts: (1) a listing of important resolutions, and (2) a country-by-country listing comparison with United States on important votes. IMPORTANT CONSENSUS RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED “WITHOUT A VOTE”

The following resolutions are identified by a short title, document number, date of vote, and results (Yes-No-Abstain or ‘without a vote’). A short description of the issue and U.S. policy considerations is also provided.

1. Comprehensive review of the whole question of peacekeeping operations in all their aspects

A/RES/71/314

07/19/2017

without a vote

This resolution codified the outcome of the 2016 negotiations of the Fourth Committee’s Special Committee on Peacekeeping Operations (C34), which reviews and provides recommendations on United Nations Peacekeeping Operations. This resolution is important because it protects key initiatives related to peacekeeping reform, including around UN policing and merit-based selection for UN positions, and preserves gains achieved in UNSC resolution 2272 (2016) with regard to combatting sexual exploitation and abuse in UN peacekeeping. It also avoids binding language on the issue of financing for certain African Union peacekeeping missions and recognizes the need for “intelligence” as a tool for force protection, planning, and operations.

2. Implementation of the outcomes of the United Nations Conferences on Human Settlements and on Housing and Sustainable Urban Development and strengthening of the United Nations Human Settlements Programme (UN-Habitat)

A/RES/72/226

12/20/2017

without a vote

This resolution emphasizes the need to improve UN system-wide coordination and coherence in the area of sustainable urbanization and human settlements within the framework of strategic planning, implementation, and governance. The United States negotiated extensively to eliminate references to proposed universal membership language for UN-Habitat, which would increase bureaucratic hurdles and costs while decreasing transparency and accountability to donors. The United States worked with like-minded delegations to include resolution language to establish a Working Group in Nairobi to explore governance structures, such as a small-focused Executive Board, to increase donor oversight and confidence in UN-Habitat.

8. Triennial review of the rates and standards for reimbursement to Member States for contingent-owned equipment

A/RES/71/296

06/30/2017

without a vote

The United States has a significant interest in the rates and reimbursement standards for Contingent Owned Equipment (COE), which accounts for roughly \$900 million of expenses annually for deployed equipment reimbursements to Troop- and Police-Contributing Countries. The 2017 COE Working Group considered 104 issue papers (more than the total issue papers for the two previous negotiations combined), with delegates from 76 Member States. This participation level represents over 90 percent of the military and police personnel deployed to peacekeeping missions and over 90 percent of the annual financial requirements for peacekeeping. The negotiations resulted in several significant policy advancements that will further the U.S. peacekeeping reform agenda, with an increase of only \$12 million from the previous agreed level in 2014 (i.e., less than 1 percent of the overall amount annually reimbursed). To put this amount into perspective, the 2014 Working Group saw an increase of \$21 million overall and the 2011 Working Group saw a similar increase. Of the approximate \$12 million increase, \$6 million is the result of a data-driven increase in self-sustainment and major equipment reimbursement rates, and \$6 million for specific proposals in issue papers meant to incentivize rapid deployment, and modernization of equipment.

9. Twentieth anniversary and promotion of the Declaration on the Right and Responsibility of Individuals, Groups and Organs of Society to Promote and Protect Universally Recognized Human Rights and Fundamental Freedoms

A/RES/72/247

12/24/2017

without a vote

The General Assembly strongly condemned the targeting, criminalization, intimidation, torture, disappearance, and killing of individuals, including human rights defenders, for reporting and seeking information on human rights violations and abuses. In that context, it decided to devote a high-level plenary meeting at its seventy-third session, in 2018, within existing resources, to the twentieth anniversary of the Declaration, requesting that the Assembly President consult with Member States to determine the scope and modalities for that meeting.

10. Women in development

A/RES/72/234

12/20/2017

without a vote

This resolution recognizes that the full engagement of governments and men and boys is necessary to ensure that women can achieve full gender equality, and encourages Member States to build women's capacity as agents of change. The United States participated in extensive negotiations to highlight the important role of women in contributing to development while ensuring that unacceptable language related to women's health was not included.

IMPORTANT CONTESTED RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED “WITH A VOTE”

The following resolutions are identified by a short title, document number, date of vote, and results (Yes-No-Abstain or ‘without a vote’). If adopted ‘with a vote,’ the U.S. vote is noted. A short description of the issue and U.S. policy considerations is also provided.

1. Agricultural technology for sustainable development

A/RES/72/215, adopted 12/20/2017 152-1-29; USA “in favor”

This biennial, Israeli-sponsored resolution highlights the importance of agricultural technology in achieving sustainable development. The resolution provides an important opportunity for the United States to support Israel at the UN, and the U.S. delegation collaborated with the Israelis to develop a solid text which received overwhelming support from like-minded delegations. As a result, the United States and like-minded countries voted ‘in favor’ on the resolution, which was passed by the General Assembly.

2. Compliance with non-proliferation, arms limitation and disarmament agreements and commitments

A/RES/72/32 12/04/2017 173-1-11; USA “in favor”

This triennial, U.S.-sponsored resolution reaffirms one of the cornerstones of a functioning international community, namely the principle of pacta sunt servanda – that parties to international conventions and treaties are bound to respect the obligations contained therein. It reinforces the foundation of a rules-based international order, reinforcing the non-proliferation and arms control regimes that form the basis of peaceful international relations. Crucially, this also enables the international community to hold individual states accountable for violations of their non-proliferation obligations.

3. Implementation of the Convention on the Prohibition of the Development, Production, Stockpiling and Use of Chemical Weapons and on their Destruction

A/RES/72/43 12/04/2017 159-7-14; USA “in favor”

Throughout extensive negotiations, the U.S. delegation advocated strongly for this annual resolution to include specific reference to the gravest threat to the chemical weapons non-proliferation regime, namely the use of chemical weapons in Syria by both ISIS and the Syrian Armed Forces. The final text of the resolution included strong condemnation of chemical weapons use and called on all parties to the Convention to comply with their obligations.

4. Taking forward multilateral nuclear disarmament negotiations

A/RES/72/31 12/04/2017 125-39-14; USA “against”

This resolution is the primary vehicle for UN Member States to support the recently negotiated treaty purporting to ban nuclear weapons, which was negotiated without the participation of the United States or of any other state possessing nuclear weapons. The treaty lacks basic verification measures, fails to account for the international security situation, and actively undermines the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty (NPT). The treaty itself and the surrounding discussion, including this resolution, exacerbate a divide between states that rely on nuclear deterrence for their security and those that reject the concept. Rather than promoting the cause of nuclear non-proliferation, the treaty

TABLE SHOWING COMPARISON WITH U.S. VOTES

The table that follows summarizes UN member state voting records for the 17 ‘important’ final plenary votes that occurred in the UN General Assembly during 2017. The **methodology** for obtaining the “voting coincidence” is comparing how the United States and the listed country voted. Votes are placed into one of four categories: same, opposite, partial, and absent. “**Same**” is the total number of times the United States and the listed country voted together. “**Opposite**” is the total number of times the United States and the listed country voted counter to each other. As part of this year’s updated methodology, a new column was included. “**Partial**” is the number of times the United States and the listed country were partially aligned (one country, but not both, abstained on a resolution). “**Absent**” is the number of times the listed country did not vote. The “**Voting Coincidence**” with the United States is **calculated** by adding one (1) point for every ‘same’ vote, zero (0) points for every ‘opposite’ vote, and a half (½) point for every ‘partial’ vote. IV — GENERAL ASSEMBLY: ISRAEL-RELATED ACTIONS

Public Law 101-246, as amended by Public Law 108-447, calls for a separate listing of all Plenary votes cast by UN member states in the General Assembly on resolutions specifically related to Israel that are opposed by the United States. This section contains two parts: (1) a listing and description of the Israel-related votes the United States opposed; and (2) voting coincidence percentages with the United States on the opposed resolutions, alphabetically by country.

These annual General Assembly resolutions condemning Israel are repetitive, disproportionate, and one-sided. Israel is repeatedly singled out for criticism, while the resolutions do not fully acknowledge that all parties to the conflict bear direct responsibility for ending it. During the 2017 calendar year, all 22 Israel-related resolutions were discussed between November 30th and December 21st. Twenty-one resolutions were adopted during the fall session of the 72nd UN General Assembly and one resolution was adopted during the 10th Emergency Session. Of the 22 Israel-related UNGA General Assembly resolutions, 21 were adopted with a vote and one was adopted by consensus with no vote. Of the 21 resolutions adopted with a vote, the United States opposed 19 and abstained on two. The two Israel-related UNGA resolutions the United States abstained on were “Assistance to Palestine Refugees” (A/RES/72/80) and “The Occupied Syrian Golan” (A/RES/72/88). On the two resolutions where the United States abstained, Israel was the sole vote ‘against’ on A/RES/72/80, and Palau joined Israel in voting ‘against’ on A/RES/72/88.

Out of 193 UN member states, only 16 countries voted at least once against an Israel-related resolution. Below is a list of the 16 countries and the number of times a country voted ‘against’ one of the 21 Israel-related resolutions that came to a vote:

Additionally, the United States believes Syria should halt its support for terrorist organizations, including Hizballah.

Peace can only be achieved through direct negotiations between the parties, not by UN resolutions.

Oil slick on Lebanese shores

A/RES/72/209 12/20/17 163-7-9

This resolution was first passed in 2006, after thousands of tons of oil spilled into the Mediterranean Sea when Israeli air strikes damaged the El-Jiyah power plant during the Israel-Hizbullah conflict that summer. The United States regrets the pollution of the Lebanese shores. However, this recurring resolution is unbalanced because it fails to acknowledge that the terrorist group Hizbullah provoked the conflict. It remains inappropriate for the General Assembly to take a position on Israel's responsibility for compensating Lebanon.

While not objecting to the Palestinian people's right of self-determination, the United States believes that renewing this resolution is unhelpful in resolving the Israeli-Palestinian conflict. It does not facilitate the vision of a two-state solution, which the United States has endorsed. This vision can only be achieved through direct negotiations between the parties, not UN resolutions.

Status of Jerusalem

A/RES/ES-10/19 12/21/17 128-9-35

The General Assembly voted during a rare emergency meeting to ask nations not to establish diplomatic missions in the historic city of Jerusalem, as delegates warned that the recent decision by the United States to do so risked igniting a religious war across the already turbulent Middle East and beyond.

The table that follows summarizes UN member state voting records for the 21 ‘Israel-related’ final plenary votes that occurred in the UN General Assembly during 2017. The **methodology** for obtaining the “voting coincidence” is comparing how the United States and the listed country voted. Votes are placed into one of four categories; same, opposite, partial, and absent. “**Same**” is the total number of times the United States and the listed country voted together. “**Opposite**” is the total number of times the United States and the listed country voted counter to each other. As part of this year’s updated methodology, a new column was included. “**Partial**” is the number of times the United States and the listed country were partially aligned (one country, but not both, abstained on a resolution). “**Absent**” is the number of times the listed country did not vote. The “**Voting Coincidence**” with the United States is **calculated** by adding one (1) point for every ‘same’ vote, zero (0) points for every ‘opposite’ vote, and a half (½) point for every ‘partial’ vote. Originally, UN member states were unofficially grouped into five geopolitical regional groups. What began as an informal means of sharing the distribution of posts for General Assembly committees has taken on a much more expansive role. Depending on the UN context, regional groups control elections to UN-related positions, on the basis of geographic representation, as well as coordinate substantive policy, and form common fronts for negotiations and voting.

VI — SECURITY COUNCIL

SUMMARY

The Security Council’s membership in 2017 consisted of the five permanent members (*China, France, Russia, the United Kingdom, and the United States*) and 10 non-permanent members (*Bolivia, Egypt, Ethiopia, Italy, Japan, Kazakhstan, Senegal, Sweden, Ukraine, and Uruguay*). The following table summarizes the activity of the Security Council for the year and compares it with the previous 10 years.

In 2017, the Security Council was heavily engaged in efforts to resolve conflicts, and to give direction to UN peacekeeping missions. Much of the Security Council’s attention continued to focus on Africa and the Middle East, especially Syria. Of the **68** draft resolutions considered in the UN Security Council for 2017, 59 were adopted unanimously, **two** were adopted with abstentions (including both Russia and China), and **seven** were defeated. Of the **seven** defeated resolutions, **four** were vetoed by Russia, **one** vetoed by Russia and China, **one** vetoed by the United States, and **one** failed to obtain the required number of votes (nine affirmative votes, and no negative vote by a permanent member of the Security Council, are necessary to adopt a resolution). All **seven** defeated resolutions were about “the situation in the Middle East,” related either to Syria or to the Palestinian question. None of the UN Security Council members were absent for any vote in 2017.

The table that follows summarizes UN member state voting records for the 68 votes that occurred in the UN Security Council during 2017. “**Same**” is the total number of times the United States and the listed country both voted together on these issues. “**Opposite**” is the total number of times the United States and the listed country voted counter to each other. “**Partial**” is the number of times the United States and the listed country were partially aligned (one country, but not both, abstained on a resolution). “**Absent**” is the total number of times the listed country was absent. The “**Voting Coincidence**” with the United States is calculated by adding one (1) point for every ‘same’ vote, zero (0) points for every ‘opposite’ vote, and a half (½) point for every ‘partial’ vote. The total number of points is then divided by the total number of votes excluding absences.
