Course Description

Most nations today may be considered as multi-cultural, that is: they are comprised

of at least two distinct societies based on different cultures. About 5000 ethnic

groups are found today in about 200 nations. It is evident that in spite of the high

hopes since the collapse of the Communist Block the number of ethnic conflicts

increased dramatically. At present about 300 conflicts are registered. Each and every

one of them is unique and yet there are some similarities which unite most of them.

This course maps the main conflicts, studies the roots and claims of the protagonists,

and based on the recognition of the similarities attempts to define a model of ethnic

conflicts and some features of possible solutions.
