REVIEW AND RECOMMENDATIONS

I. TRIAL DATA: The secused were tried at Dachou, Germany, on 27 August 1947, before a General Military Government Court.

II. CHARGES AND PARTICULARS:

CHARGS I: Viol tion of the Laws and Usages of War.

Particulars: In that Wilhelm HINDERGE, a German National, and Josef POSTL, Austrian National, did, at or in the vicinity of Ludwigslust, Germany, in or about April 1945, wrongfully encourage, aid, abet and participate in the killing of an unknown non-German national, an immate of Buchenwald Concentration Camp, who was then in the custody of the then German heich.

III. DATA AS TO ACCUSAD:

1. Wilhelm HINDSREE

This accused was acquitted (A 63).

2. Josef POSTL

This accused was acquitted (R 63).

IV. SUMMARY OF EVIDENCE: On 11 April 1945, inmates left Camp
Scho nebeck, an outcamp of Buchenweld Concentration Camp, on an evacuation merch, and proceeded in the direction of Oranienburg. There
were six to seven hundred inmates on the merch and the accused served
as gurards on the merch (R 9). On about 26 April 1945, when the column rested and some of the inmates were in a barn, the accused fixed
several pistol shots at an eggshell lying on the ground a short distence from the foundation wall of the barn. As a result of this pistol fire, an inmate, said to have been a Frenchman, was shot and killed
(R 9-11, 22-24). Austria was a coballigarent of Germany.

The Court had jurisdiction of the persons of the accused and of

Evidence for Prosecution: The accused offered a plea of guilty to all charges and particulars, except that he stated in Court that he did not know whether the innates assaulted were non-German nationals (R 8). He admitted that he beat and kicked inmates (R 9). The Court refused to accept the plea of guilty and entered a plea of not guilty for the accused (R 11).

One witness stated in his Statement that the accused, an SS master sergeant and detail leader at Buchenwald Concentration Camp, together with SS Technical Sergeant Schmidt, carried out a reign of terror among inmates in the detail; that there was not a day that members of the detail were not mistreated with a thick club by Schmidt or with a knotted stick entwined with steal wire by the accused (R 2B; P-Ex 9A). Another witness stated in his Statement that in the early winter months of 1944, the accused, a master sergeant and detail leader at the Gustloff Works, beat Russian, Belgian and French inmates viciously in the lavatory of nall 1 and that he saw the accused beating inmates in the jaws with his clanched fists (R 29; P-Ex 10A). A witness testified that the work place of the accused's detail was the construction site for railroad station Buchenwald, which was later on the Gustlori works lastory (R 20).

Defense witness Kramars stated in his unsworn pretrial statement that he was an inmate of Buchenwald from March 1943 until April 1945 and that he knew the accused there as an NS noncommissioned officer and detail leader in the Gustloff Works factory (R 30; D-Ex 1A).
