

Current Protests:

An Online Study of Palestinian Youth (16-35 Years Old)

Publication Date: 10 December 2015 Fieldwork: 1-7 December 2015 Sample Size: 505 Palestinian youth

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Introduction: From December 1-7, AWRAD conducted a specialized public opinion survey targeting Palestinian youth. The goal of this survey was to assess current perceptions regarding the wave of protests that has occurred in the West Bank and Gaza Strip (WBG) since September 2015, as well as a variety of other themes related to the lives of youth. The poll targeted 505 Palestinian men and women between the ages of 16 and 35, both inside and outside of the WBG.

Highlights:

- 86 percent of youth believe there are insufficient opportunities for growth and 80 percent believe that participation of youth in national decision-making processes is unsatisfactory.
- The majority of youth are active to some degree in following the protests and demonstrations on social media.
- Youth largely believe that the current protests are non-partisan, and that they are participated in by only a small cross-section of society.
- Frustration with the failure of the peace process and the continuing occupation is believed to be the main cause of the current protests, followed by dissatisfaction with Hamas and Fatah, and youth expressing their patriotism.
- Youth believe the current protests will continue for some time, at the current intensity, though they are skeptical that anything substantive will be achieved. A majority of youth supports the protests, regardless.
- The majority of youth are critical of the responses of all major parties and organizations to the current situation, though they are most upset with the reaction of the PA.
- Significant numbers of youth in East Jerusalem and the West Bank report that they or their family members have had negative experiences with Israelis (soldiers or settlers) since the start of the recent round of clashes.
- At the present time, the majority of youth support attacks against Israeli soldiers and settlers. They are more divided, however, when it comes to supporting attacks on civilians within the Green Line.
- At the present time, a majority of youth identify armed struggle as the best means to end the occupation.

General Youth Circumstances: Overall, Palestinian youth believe they are marginalized with few opportunities, facing obstacles from both the Israeli occupation and Palestinian governments. The majority (86 percent) of youth believe there are insufficient opportunities for growth, to varying degrees. A similar majority (80 percent) believes that the participation of youth in national decision-making process is unsatisfactory, to varying degrees. Additionally, 35 percent believe their economic situation is bad, compared to 25 percent who believe it is good and 39 percent who believe it is fair.

Palestinian youth identify restrictions on rights and freedoms as the greatest impact of the Israeli occupation. The largest group of respondents (44 percent) says the ability to move freely is the aspect of their life that is most influenced. A further 24 percent identify the ability to find work and economic opportunities; while 14 percent choose

the ability to maximize their talents and a final 3 percent select the ability to get a good education. Significantly, only 12 percent identify exposure to direct violence as the greatest impact of the occupation.

Overall, these economic, political and social factors have engendered a prevailing sense of pessimism among youth. Specifically, 84 percent identify their outlook for their future as "bleak," compared to only 11 percent who are hopeful.

Perceptions of the Current Protests: Youth display varying degrees of activity in the current protests. Presently, 21 percent are following the news and posting or reposting related pictures and videos on their Facebook pages. The greatest number (44 percent) are frequently following events through the media, including social media, though not actively posting or commenting. In contrast, 28 percent are only occasionally following events through media and a final 4 percent are too busy to become involved.

Youth largely believe that the current protests are non-partisan. Specifically, 86 percent believe that the protests are spontaneous actions by individual Palestinians, as opposed to organized events by political parties. Additionally, 70 percent believe that protests are carried out by a small number of participants, rather than being a popular demonstration by all segments of society.

According to a plurality of respondents (37 percent), the cause of current protests is the failure of the peace process and the continuation of the occupation. This is followed by approximately one-fourth (24 percent) who believe the protests are an expression of frustration against the PA in the West Bank and Hamas in Gaza. A similar number (22 percent) believe it is an expression of patriotism by youth too young to have participated in the First or Second Intifada. A final 12 percent believe the cause is frustration over limited economic prospects.

The Future of the Protests: Youth do not believe that the intensity of the current protests will change substantially in the near term. Currently, 53 percent believe they will continue at the same level of intensity for some time, while 24 percent believe they will expand into a Third Intifada and 19 percent believe they will end soon, with little achievement.

Regardless of their duration or intensity, youth do not believe the demonstrations will alter the *status quo*. 50 percent believes that the current protests will have no change on the Palestinian struggle for statehood, and a similar number (48 percent) believe they will produce no substantive change on the ground. A plurality of respondents (41 percent) believes that the protests will neither improve nor worsen their personal life.

Despite perceptions of limited efficacy, Palestinian youth remain supportive of the protests. A majority (57 percent) expresses support for their continuation, while 28 percent express opposition and the final 15 percent are neutral.

Perception of Palestinian Parties: Palestinian youth are critical of major parties and their behavior and responses to the current protests. The PA receives the greatest criticism, with 67 percent of youth saying they view the body's response negatively.

Islamic Jihad receives the least criticism, though a majority (54 percent) still expresses negative opinions of the group's response to date.

Violence and Support for Attacks: Since the current wave of protests began in September, Palestinian youth report various direct impacts experienced by themselves or members of their family. Palestinian youth in East Jerusalem (52 percent) are most likely to report harassment, which is also common among youth in the rest of the West Bank (45 percent). Those in East Jerusalem (15 percent) are also more likely than those in the West Bank (12 percent) to report damage to their property. In contrast, youth in the West Bank are more likely to have experienced arrest (16 percent v. 7 percent) or injury and death (14 percent v. 7 percent). These impacts are less likely in Gaza as a result of the limited direct contact with Israeli soldiers and none with settlers. However, residents in Gaza (4 percent), along with those in East Jerusalem (4 percent), are more likely to have experienced home demolitions.

Within the current context, a majority of Palestinian youth expresses support for attacks on Israelis, though variances in opinion are visible. Youth are most likely to support attacks against Israeli soldiers (81 percent), while slightly less support attacks against Israeli settlers (77 percent). Fewer (49 percent) support attacks against Israeli civilians within the Green Line (Israel proper).

At the present time, a majority of Palestinian youth (53 percent) identify armed struggle as the best means to end the occupation. Other options include international advocacy (16 percent), non-violent protest (11 percent) and negotiations (8 percent). 12 percent are uncertain which they prefer.

Future Outlook: 43 percent of youth believe that Palestinian society is heading in the wrong direction, while 39 percent believe it is heading in the right direction and 19 percent are unsure. These misgivings are reflected in the future outlook of youth with 49 percent pessimistic about the future, compared to 45 percent who are optimistic.
