- 2. From the Balfour Declaration to the Mandate: the contradictory British commitments to the Arabs and the Jews.
- 3. The Military Administration and the new national character of the conflict: The Palestinian Congress and the Zionist Commission.

- 4. The beginning of violence: The riots of 1920 and 1921
- 5. The establishment of Transjordan Emirate and its separation from the national Home: The Cairo conference of 1921 and Churchill's White paper of 1922
- 6. The religious aspect of the conflict: the Wailing Wall crisis and the riots of 1929
- 7. Zionist scepticism and Arab militancy after the riots
- 8. The demographic, economic and settlement competition
- 9. The Palestinian Revolt and its repression; the White Paper of May 1939
- 10. The search for solutions: partition, federation, binationalism, cantonization and the "minorities block"
- 11. The impact of the Second World War on the conflict
- 12. From a local to regional conflict: the Arab states, the Arab League and the question of Palestine.
- 13. The four focuses of the conflict: the legitimacy of Israel, the borders, the refugees and Jerusalem
