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14	Meeti	Meeting Minutes:	
15	DT:	We progressed significantly in this committee. What remains is a paragraph on	
16	the in	ternational fund mechanism, and looking ahead. The trip to Ireland was fruitful	
17	and w	e found how making peace is such hard work because the most difficult task is	
18	how to	o keep peace running after 10 years.	
19	SE:	I think that South Africa is the most striking experience.	
20	UD:	But they didn't have a two-state solution	
21	SE:	Neither did Northern Ireland!	
22	UD:	We can see other countries.	
23	SE:	I know you don't like to hear "South Africa".	
24	DT:	We don't rule things out.	

- SE: Ok, among other states, South Africa is important.
- 2 DT: So just to recap: we are waiting for a final paragraph and what should be our
- focus next. We suggest meeting with people who work on this field today,
- 4 organizations such as Panorama Center; and we had another idea: how do we affect the
- 5 image of either side, i.e. we need to have public opinion surveys with a number of
- 6 questions and gather common data about the perceptions from each side on the other,
- 7 so that we understand where to focus efforts to change.
- 8 SAZ: A friend of mine is a teacher at Tel Aviv University, he has a survey ready and
- 9 he asked me to check with him what kind of questions fit our work. He is doing the
- 10 Israeli poll only.

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- 11 DT: It might be better to organize the survey with some international experts.
- 12 SE: Can I say something? I really believe that making peace, reaching an agreement
- is the easiest step but the day after is what really counts. You cannot have people to
- people projects in a culture of war. So I fully agree with you that meetings should take
- place to visualize the day after; meetings with people who have experience: Panorama,
- Perez Centers, and Seeds of Peace. In Seeds of Peace, we managed to keep camps twice
- every summer and even get kids from Gaza attend camps. We should seek the
- 18 experience of these people. I think we should pay a visit to Bosnia-Herzegovina (a
- region of true bloodshed in the past) and with this package I want to add South Africa.
- The point is reconciliation, the day after, not Apartheid Israel as you fear. I went there
- with a high Israeli official; it struck me how these negotiators agreed on two principles:
- 22 1) to never interrupt negotiations, 2) help others. Palestinians learned this ten years
- later. I believe South Africa should play a major role, along with Bosnia or other

- suggestions to learn their reconciliation mechanisms the day after the agreement. I also
- 2 suggest Sufian to be the first Palestinian ambassador in Tel Aviv. (laughs)
- 3 UD: What about Kamil?
- 4 SE: He can be ambassador on both sides. As for the international fund, it's too early
- 5 to talk about it. Let's wait and see what's required first. I accept your suggestion of
- 6 meeting with organizations who work on this field. We need to learn from them. I think
- 7 I will give a lecture at Seeds of Peace one day. Let's forget about sensitivities (insisting
- 8 again on South Africa).
- 9 UD: I would like to ask something. You're afraid of dealing with current issues. We
- need to create an environment of peace, we need to see the opinions of the people.
- 11 SE: Israel is not ready. I'm not afraid (gave examples of involvement in Seeds of
- Peace).
- 13 UD: We need to change the environment.
- SE: Not with the mentality of your army. The rules of engagement of your soldiers
- will not change. Official Israel is not ready for that. Let's go to the Israelis who are
- ready and let's hope you change, and stop your security pretexts. (SE gave example of
- people not being able to cross checkpoints, including kids from Seeds of Peace.)
- 18 UD: I understand that. But you cannot switch in one day.
- 19 SE: I agree to have brainstorming sessions with organizations who work on people
- to people but don't be involved in this now, you'll destroy it.
- 21 DT: It's an important point. Independent groups are better because sometimes
- governments can kill such efforts, but there may also be ways we can help them in
- areas they are having difficulties.
- SE: I leave it to you and Sufian to see these groups.

- 1 DT: What about the joint survey?
- 2 SE: Yes and joint travels. If we don't guard the day after, we are ruined. You can't
- 3 guard agreements in such stupid mentalities.
- 4 UD: Try to take off.
- 5 SAZ: Let's plan next trips.
- 6 UD: Bosnia ok but we need to check for South Africa.
- 7 DT: [Notes that in order for a particular location to be sellable to his side politically,
- 8 they need concrete examples of what exactly can be learned from that place, which
- 9 **requires research**. For example a good model of joint education programs, an effective
- fund, a good truth and reconciliation commission, etc. He noted it was not a holiday
- and although he would love to go to the Bahamas, he didn't really think that a good
- iustification could be found on why that would be useful.] We need projects where you
- learn on international funds for reconciliation.
- 14 SAZ: We need to do research.
- 15 DT: So let's fix a meeting in the next two weeks to discuss 1) possible destinations
- and 2) surveys. [DT also notes that **research needed to be done** on independent non-
- Palestinian and non-Israeli institutions that could conduct surveys. The idea is that a
- third party surveyor would be less likely to appear as the polling is targeted to produce
- a pre-determined outcome.
- 20 SE: Check with Khalil Shikaki, the Hebrew University and JMCC (Ghassan
- 21 Khatib).
- 22 DT: Maybe we can invite people from Panorama and Perez Centers to parts of our
- 23 meeting.

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
